- 2. With Workable Conditions
- 3. Within a Workable Timeframe
- 4. That Avoids Litigation <u>or</u>
- That Maximizes The Chances of Successful Litigation
- 6. At Reasonable Cost



Permitting Success Requires Strategic Thinking at Every Step

- Site Selection
- Outreach/Messaging
- Permitting Process
- Litigation
- Compliance



Be Careful in Selecting a Site

- Goal: Maximizing productivity and efficiency while minimizing opposition and regulatory hurdles
- Seek Out Favorable Jurisdictions
- Understand State and Local Permitting Process
- Minimize Potential Sources of Opposition
- Environmental Issues
- Tribal Interests
- User Conflicts
- Show Your Work



Early Outreach is Critical

- Develop Your Allies
- Seek to Reduce or Eliminate Opposition
- Don't Say Anything You Wouldn't Like to See Printed in the Paper (or Facebook)



Early Outreach is Critical

- Be Proactive
- Listen
- Be Willing to Adjust
- Phasing/ Mitigation Measures
- Site Visits



Identify Critical Issues

- Understand Areas of Concern
- Develop Strategy Regarding How to Address
- Be Proactive Include in Application Materials



Proactive Engagement in Permitting

- Submit a Fully Baked Application
- Do Not Rely Exclusively Upon Regulators Regarding Permitting Process
- Permit Sequencing Matters
- Develop Your Team Early in Permitting Process
- Know Deadlines
 - Deadlines for your responses
 - Deadlines for public comment
 - Agency deadlines (and when/how they can be extended)
- Be Engaged in Consultation with NMFS/USFWS



Know Your Opposition

- What Are Their Goals?
- What Do They Want?
 - Changes to the Project
 - No Project At All
 - No Project At All (And Willing to Fight)
- Is There Room to Compromise?
- What Is the Litigation Risk?



Create and Defend Your Administrative Record

- Use Experts Where Needed to Fill Information Gaps
- Engage in Environmental Review, Even if Prepared by Regulatory Agency
- Key Issue: EA/EIS and Level of State Environmental Review
- Provide Responses to Comments Level of Opposition Drives Level of Response
- Develop Gameplan for Public Hearings



Understand Litigation Risk Before Litigation

- Do You Have Funding?
- Do You Have Agency Support?
- What is Your Farm Schedule?
- Is There a Risk of a Stay/Injunction?

6 Tips for Successful Litigation Strategy

- Define Success –
 Litigation vs.
 Settlement
- 2) Administrative Record is Key
- 3) Coordination with Agency – Early and Frequent



6 Tips for Successful Litigation Strategy


- 4) Statute of Limitations?

Sorry – generally no attorneys fees


What If Regulators are Opposed?

- Escalate low to high during permitting process
- In litigation, process challenges win more than substantive ones
- Make sure to protect administrative record
- Is it a taking?

- Pay Close Attention to Post-Approval Requirements
 - Monitoring
 - GearManagement
 - Reporting
 - NPDES
